

## **NATIONAL INTEGRATION COUNCIL SEEKS TO CREATE A VIBRANT PUBLIC, PRIVATE, AND PEOPLE (3P) NETWORK TO SUPPORT SOCIAL INTEGRATION**

A vibrant public, private and people (3P) network is instrumental in supporting social integration. The National Integration Council (NIC), led by its Chairman Dr Vivian Balakrishnan engaged and connected with key stakeholders from community organisations, unions, schools and the public sector in a close-door dialogue on 12 January 2010 to seek views on how more can be done to create better support for integration initiatives. About 120 members from the NIC and its various Working Groups and key stakeholders participated in the dialogue. Dr Balakrishnan is also the Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports.

2 During the dialogue, Dr Balakrishnan gave an update on strategies and ideas to open the doors, hearts and minds of both the newcomers to our society and Singaporeans. These included the uptake of the \$10 million Community Integration Fund (CIF) and key projects supported under the Fund since its launch in September 2009, as well as new initiatives to increase the English language proficiencies of new immigrants. Dr Balakrishnan also shared on the launch of the pilot Singapore Citizenship Journey aimed to integrate new citizens to our society.

### **Opening Doors - Community Integration Fund**

3 Launched in September 2009, the Community Integration Fund (CIF), a \$10 million fund over three years has helped create more opportunities for interaction between Singaporeans and new citizens by supporting 11 community celebrations with both local and new immigrant participants<sup>1</sup>. In all, over 50,000 locals and non-locals in Singapore have bonded closer together and learnt more about our multi-cultural heritage through CIF-supported projects.

### **Opening Minds – English Language Initiatives**

4 The NIC will encourage more immigrants to take up English language courses. A website will be launched, which the public can use to search for an English course that will suit their schedule, learning needs, and budget. The NIC will also increase publicity of language courses at immigration touchpoints, including getting community organisations to encourage their members to go for courses. More brochures highlighting the many different training avenues will also be made available.

## **Opening Hearts – Singapore Citizenship Journey**

5 The pilot of the Singapore Citizenship Journey will be launched in March 2010, in three group representation constituencies (GRCs). More details will be announced at a later date. The Singapore Citizenship Journey will be an enhanced orientation programme for new citizens, incorporating interactive online elements, site visits to places of historical significance, and grassroots sharing sessions. All new citizens will go through this Journey, which will culminate in a citizenship ceremony. The Journey aims to help open the hearts of new citizens to fully integrate into life in the Singapore society.

1.	<p><b>Title of project: Mid-Autumn Festival Celebrations</b>  <b>Organisers: Tian Fu Club and Singapore Amoy Association</b>  <b>Date of event: 3 Oct 09</b></p> <p>Tian Fu Club collaborated with the Singapore Amoy Association (SAA) to organise a joint Mid Autumn Festival celebration. The programme consisted of two parts –a dialogue session where four speakers (two locals and two new immigrants) shared their experiences and views on integration in Singapore, followed by a dinner. The event drew more than 300 participants consisting of 100 Tian Fu members, 150 SAA members and more than 50 invited guests from other community organisations.</p>
2.	<p><b>Title of project: Narpani-Vasantham Family Day Carnival 2009 @ Jurong Bird Park</b>  <b>Date of event: 8 Nov 09</b>  <b>Organiser: Narpani Pearavai, PA Indian Activity Executive Committees Council (IAECC)</b></p> <p>This event engaged new citizens and permanent residents, to promote Indian culture and family bonding, and served as a platform for different ethnic groups to interact. Spanning a full day at the Jurong Bird Park, it was carried out in a carnival setting to provide families with an avenue to bond and get together. The attractions at the bird park, an “Amazing Race” for families, fringe activities like face painting, henna painting, and games, engaged and bonded the participants. About 10,000 participants attended the event, where Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong was Guest-of-Honour.</p>
3.	<p><b>Title of project: The Peranakan Festival 2009</b>  <b>Date of event: 27 Nov to 6 Dec 09</b>  <b>Organiser: The Peranakan Association</b></p> <p>The festival consisted of various events, all open to the public, to raise awareness of Peranakan Culture, and highlight the harmonious blend of different cultures. The festival consciously sought to propagate the idea by which all racial communities may in the steady progress of time be welded into one community having a common national identity, while each community retains or preserves its own culture, custom, tradition and religion. Deliberate attempts were also made to reach out and welcome new residents, to invite and encourage them to</p>

4.	<p><b>Title of project: 2010@Labrador: Celebration &amp; Integration</b>  <b>Organiser: Hua Yuan Association</b>  <b>Date of event: 31 Dec 09</b></p> <p>This year end celebration event at Labrador Park, 31 Dec 09, brought together new Singapore citizens (SCs), Permanent Residents (PRs) and locals to usher in the New Year. The event provided a platform for young people from local community and immigrant groups to interact, thereby facilitating better understanding and formation of new friendships. Multi racial groups were also invited to perform to promote racial harmony.</p> <p>The event attracted approximately 15,000 people, and was co-organised by Hua Yuan and Radin Mas Citizens' Consultative Committee (CCC). Radin Mas CCC invited local residents staying near Tanjong Pagar, Redhill and Telok Blangah, while Hua Yuan mobilised its members and liaised with student bodies to invite Chinese students.</p> <p>Running from 10 pm to 6 am, the event involved a series of activities such as stage performances by different ethnic groups, movie marathon, barbeques, game stalls, youth dancing party, children and family activities, and a lucky draw.</p>
5.	<p><b>Title of project: River Hongbao 2010</b>  <b>Date of event: 12 Feb to 20 Feb 2010</b>  <b>Organiser: Singapore Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Singapore Federation of Chinese Clan Associations, Singapore Press Holding, Singapore Tourism Board and People's Association</b></p> <p>River Hong Bao celebrations began in 1987 as an annual large-scale signature cultural event. Its objectives are: to create a platform whereby Singaporeans and residents in Singapore can celebrate Chinese New Year together and promote community and family bonding amongst different races in Singapore.</p> <p>RHB 2010 is expected to attract a crowd of 300,000. The organisers have proposed the following enhancements:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Overall integration-centric theme throughout the festival.</li> <li>- Immigrant communities to be represented on organising committee.</li> <li>- Involve immigrant associations in performances and booths.</li> <li>- Offer a variety of cuisines and performances to highlight the diversity within the Chinese community.</li> </ul>

6.	<p><b>Title of project: Community Integration Quiz @ South West (tentative working title)</b>  <b>Organiser: South West Community Development Council</b>  <b>Date of event: December 2009 to March 2010</b></p> <p>The Community Integration Quiz @ South West will adopt a quiz format to engage and facilitate interaction between locals and new citizens and to deepen their understanding of one another and living in Singapore. Participants will go through qualifying rounds in teams, where they are posed general and thematic questions about Singapore. These questions will be compiled concertedly with community and corporate stakeholders, and span categories including culture, history, lingo and cuisine. The quiz will comprise of three stages i.e. qualifying round, semi-finals and finals, which will take place at community places for visibility and mass participation.</p> <p>32 teams of five members (160 participants in total) will be formed. Each team must consist of at least two ethnic groups and have at least one new SC or PR. An estimated 4000 residents will be involved in event participation and another 6000 residents will be engaged through virtual participation through channels such as the CDC website, YouTube and Facebook etc.</p> <p>The wider community will also be engaged in the process through submission of questions for the Quiz, participation in the events and online quizzes, and publicity in My Paper (supporting newspaper).</p>
7.	<p><b>Title of project: Rafta Rafta (All in Good Time)</b>  <b>Organiser: Hum Theatre Limited</b>  <b>Date of event: April 2010</b></p> <p>“Rafta Rafta” will examine the challenges faced by an immigrant Punjabi family, their marital woes, and inter-racial difficulties. The play deals with setting out and resolving these various issues through comedy.</p> <p>Through the play, Hum Theatre hopes to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Address issues commonly experienced by the Indian community, regardless of their ethnicity or language</li> <li>- Provide an environment for the exchange of ideas, creative collaboration, and working processors for individuals (students or professionals) from across the Indian community.</li> <li>- In a language commonly understood by Indians of any background.</li> </ul>
